Dear Lebone Parents and Friends,

Lebone II College strives to offer its students a rich and varied education. We seek to educate the whole child by ensuring that every child has the opportunity to explore their talents and to express who they are. In this second term I have had the privilege of being present to see so much of this mission in action – through academic breadth and prowess, or determination and team work on the sports field, dramatic and musical excellence; cake-baking or gardening - I have seen Lebone students and staff stretching themselves to new heights.

I believe that this newsletter does justice to some of the amazing work done at this school over the last two months. I would like to take this opportunity to share some thoughts and news with you regarding our school and our school community:

In celebration

- Our Johnny Clegg concert was a significant success for our school. It promoted Lebone II as a venue for hosting world class events. We continue to be a centre for the performing arts, and our community came out in support of the event with an audience of over 1,600 people. Johnny Clegg performed two memorable songs with our choir, and we raised funds towards scholarships for our school. I wish to thank the many staff members, the PSO, and the parent volunteers who worked tirelessly to make this world class event a success and to everyone who showed up on the night to share it with us.
- I am delighted to announce that we have been given the green light to go ahead with the construction of our Lebone Swimming Centre which will include a 25m competition pool and a smaller 'learn-to-swim' pool. This follows the very generous announcement by the Royal Bafokeng Supreme Council that they will fund two-thirds of the cost of the pool. I wish to thank the Royal Bafokeng Nation for continuing to invest in this school. The remaining third of the cost has been raised by our school over the last 4 years. Further details regarding the construction program we will be shared in the coming term.
- We are proud to announce that Mr George Harris, the previous Headmaster of our College, has been appointed as the new Headmaster of Hilton College in the KZN Midlands. We congratulate Mr Harris and his family and celebrate this news with him. I know that he will carry his experiences of this school and the RBN close to his heart as he continues to shine his light in a new school.

In appreciation

Thank you to so many Lebone II parents who completed the on-line IQAA survey. The surveys that we are running are a part of a compulsory accreditation process for the Independent Schools Association of SA

(ISASA), titled 'School in a Mirror'. It invites us to look into our practices, to get feedback on what we are doing well and equally what can be improved. We then need to set up discussion forums which will lead us towards a School Improvement Plan (SIP). Your participation has been crucial. We have heard your voice alongside those of our staff and students.

- Thank you to those parents who have involved themselves in PSO projects. Your participation in our school is crucial if we are to keep growing as a school of excellence. I do challenge more parents to get involved – we are a community that requires all members of our Lebone family to work together.
- I am excited by the admission process that closed on 27 May. We have had a record number of applicants for our school, which shows a growing interest in our school. Thank you to all Lebone family members who speak highly of the school, who market our school through their actions and choice of words, and who believe in what we are doing here.

Values – I trust that conversations about the following happen regularly in all of our homes.

- **Appreciation** – in our school, we are all blessed with so many amazing opportunities and resources. I am not sure that we always appreciate what we have. There are too many incidences of disrespectful actions towards property, towards others, towards that which we are given at school. Appreciation cannot only be for what suits us, it needs to be consistent, at all times.
- **Gratitude** – 'please and thank you'. Words our parents drummed into us. Actions that our parents drummed into us. Gratitude to **all people** for their actions that serve us.
- **Manners** – 'manners maketh man(kind)'. This sounds cliché, but it still rings true. I receive many compliments about the manners of our students. Please continue to engage in conversations about what manners are and why they are important.
- **Kindness** – at times I worry that kindness is dwindling in our world. 'It is never okay to be unkind' – this needs to be our mantra. Kindness needs to be modelled all the time! At school I have to deal with occasions in which kindness is forgotten too often. If you can be anything, be kind.

Creating awareness

- Please note that we have introduced a new Debtors Tracking system in our Business Office. What this means is that families will receive an initial sms as a reminder should there be any anomaly regarding the payment of your fees. This system is already in use, and reminders have been sent out in the past week.

In closing – As a school we pride ourselves on diversity, on truly embracing difference and seeking that which unites us, rather than that which defines us as different. I believe that some of what we see on our university campuses and in our country at the moment is a reflection of our differences and our inability to truly understand one another through real, deep dialogue.

At Lebone II we hope to engage these conversations much earlier than tertiary study with the faith that our students are able to truly embrace difference and uniqueness. It is idealistic, but carries our hope for the future and future generations.

GENERAL NEWS

- During this term, the following activities have taken place in **Lower School**:
Grade R was enchanted by a visit to the Fire Station and golf course, and wrote a storybook about a fire fighter. **Grade 1** baked gingerbread and enjoyed shopping through using coins at a fruit and vegetable shop, as well as, a visit to Boekenhoutfontein. **Grade 2** enjoyed a successful outing to Bester Birds in Pretoria, where they could hand feed animals.
Grade 4 went on an outing to Spar and Manor Hills to do action research and learn about producing and consuming, and have visited Phokeng to find evidence of the Bafokeng history. This is especially important in the year of the Bafokeng Pilgrimage. The Tigers enjoyed throwing Ma'am Venter a birthday party and organised this function on their own. The pathway from the Staff Car Park has also been decorated with Grade 4 rock art masterpieces.
Grade 5 had an outing to Mafikeng for netball and soccer, which was fun and successful. **Grade 6** undertook a unit of inquiry about business - this included shadowing their parents at work and interviewing managers and shop keepers at the Mall. The students said it was hard work to be an adult!
- All of the classes in Lower School are proud of their **vegetable gardens**, an initiative started by Ma'am du Preez, and have been fascinated to observe the vegetables grow. They look forward to their first crops soon and it seems Grade 4 may win the harvesting race.
- On 21 April 2016 **Lower School Setswana** department held a **PIE Evening** where the main focus was to have an opportunity to discuss the teaching and learning of Setswana with reference to the expectation and interpretation of the curriculum. Skills and structure were discussed, as well as, language learning tips, such as labelling household items in Setswana and encouraging children to speak to friends and family in Setswana. Helping children to make their own Setswana picture dictionaries will also be helpful.
- We have been awarded with the **Green Flag Award** for our efforts to teach and maintain ecological practices, with the support and dedication of **Wessa**. This will be presented at an award ceremony early 2017. Lebone II is one of three schools nationally that has been assessed successfully in 2016 and will be mentioned in the Winter Eco-Schools newsletter.
- The **National Science EXPO** was once again a huge event on the Lebone calendar this year! All the Grade 7 – 9 learners had to submit projects, as did the Grade 10 and 11 Science students. The best projects will be awarded certificates and we will choose some of our best projects to send to the Regional EXPO. Generally, the projects were not of the same quality as they were last year, but there were some outstanding projects that deserve to go to the next rounds. The Science Department recognises that the EXPO can be a strain on families. We would like to thank every parent and tutor who became involved - we appreciate your assistance and co-operation in this. The reason why we do the EXPO every year is because we are training the students for the One Research Task that they have to do in Grade 12, and the skill required to do this successfully really takes years of practice. In

addition to that there are a huge number of bursaries for tertiary studies, as well as, cash and other prizes to be won should they make it to the National EXPO. The Science Department feel that it is important that we give our students this opportunity to win some of these prizes, as well as, to compete with other school in an academic forum like this.

- We celebrated the fun of maths with our **Mathy Hour** this term. Mathy Hour brings together students, parents and educators to share in problem solving, figuring out patterns, generating equations, making mistakes and enjoying learning from the path that they have taken. We witnessed the quietest of students engaging and bringing BRILLIANT ideas to the fore. The bug had bitten them and it was not easy to let go. On behalf of Mathematics department, we would like to send our gratitude to all parents and students who came through. More of these opportunities will present themselves and we look forward to interacting with parents and children in a space that is free and open to ideas. Akanyang Centre for Teaching (ACT)

Akanyang is the name that has been given to the new Bafokeng teacher training college. The purpose of the College is to train new educators for the Foundation Phase of schooling, and in so doing to give support and education for Morafe, as well as, providing jobs and stimulating Primary Schools in the Bafokeng areas. Mofokeng who are training with Akanyang are often present at the Lebone II Lower School, where they shadow teachers and learn more about the teaching process in real classroom situations. As well as the support and guidance shown by the Lower School teachers, the Lebone II Library and the Lebone I.T. Centre have collaborated with Akanyang students in becoming users of the facilities.

SPORTS NEWS

- Lebone Upper School participated in the North West **Netball** league this term. There was a huge improvement from last year's performance and we are proud of the girls and how they conducted themselves.
- The Upper School **Soccer Platinum League** girls and senior boys made it to the Semi-finals of the Platinum League. Unfortunately, they did not advance to the Finals this year, but we are looking forward to the next league.
- Our First Team Senior Boys will travel to East London from 26 – 30 June for the **South African School Champs Tournament**. Lebone is the only team from North West province who will be competing. We all wish them good luck on their travels.
- The u/11 and u/13 **Soccer and Netball festival at ISSA** in Mafikeng was a blast and the players played at a much higher level than last year. Well done.
- **Basketball** has improved from last year. We look forward to greater improvements during the year.
- The **Lebone Upper School hockey team** participated in the NW Hockey league this term. Although last season only 3 teams went through, we were excited that all of the hockey teams made it to the Play-offs round this year. Unfortunately, only the **First Team Boys** advanced to the Semi-Finals, where they had to meet last years' winning team, HTS Klerksdorp. It was a fearsome battle and the boys lost 2-3. They played like champions!
- The **First Team hockey tour to Cape Town** during April holiday was a huge success and the team benefitted from such good exposure at the Tournament. We look forward to going again. A huge shout out to all the sponsors who made it possible.

- Although **Cross Country** wasn't the full provincial selection, a team was selected to represent North West North at an interprovincial cross country meet in Mpumalanga. This event took place on Saturday 11 June. The runners selected include Keabaka Molobye, Entle Makhinta and Sports Director Herme Visser.
- The **Soccer Referees** have been busy:
Omogolo Masike, Ramono Pilane, Othusitse Modise, Letlotlo Morule, Mpho Montsho, Setso Kewakae, Khumo Soul, Owen Englton, Sizwe Kubeka are officiating the **PSL Academy League games**. Otlotleng Motalane, Letlotlo Morule, Reneilwe Pilane, Ramono Pilane, Mpho Montsho are invited to referee the **South African Schools' Championships** in Durban in July.
Othusitse Modise was invited to referee the **SAB National u19 Championships** in Polokwane in July. Entle Nuku and Letlotlo Morule ran the **new FIFA fitness test** in Pretoria a few weeks back. The fitness test is a lot more difficult than previous fitness tests and referees have to pass the test in order to be able to advance in refereeing.
- 10-year-old **Ntuma Moagi** demonstrated his talent, dedication and resilience through gaining his **South African National Chess Colours**. Ntuma is now part of the top 10 Chess Champions in the country and will represent the country in Port Elizabeth for the Africa Youth Championship later in 2016. Should he qualify there he will play for the country in Iceland. We look forward to hearing of Ntuma's successes and wish him luck at every step.
- A **SHOUT OUT** to all of the **Lebone coaches, teachers** and **photographers** who are involved in sport. Thank you for putting in the time and effort with these young athletes. The sports department salutes you for making Sport shine here at Lebone.
- Another **SHOUT OUT** – this time to all of the **students** who have given up their Saturday mornings and free afternoons to put in some hard work and dedication to their practise. CULTURAL NEWS

- Ramono Pilane in Grade 11 has been selected to participate in the 2016 South African Institute of **International Affairs Young Leaders Conference** held at Wits from 26 June – 1 July. This is through the **Model United Nations** and he was selected out of 75 learners nationwide. He is the first Lebone II College student to be selected and the only North-West student who will be at the Conference.
- The **SAASTA Debate Competition** took place on 21 May for the North-West Province and Lebone proudly hosted the event. The Lebone II team came second out of the 9 schools that attended. 3 of these schools are from the Bafokeng community. Mr Antonio, who runs the Lebone II Debate Team, shared the SAASTA information with RBI in the hope that Bafokeng schools could attend.
- The **Lower School Intermediate Phase Setswana** teachers arranged for Grade 5 to go on a tour to Moruleng museum on 10 May. On 17 May the Grade 6 concluded their unit on Communication. Their learning and experiences include communication in the past, Bakgatla-ba-Kgafela and the Tswana culture, relating the culture to the current practises in their homes, compared communication in the past and now and engaged in Tswana cultural experiments such as using cow dung to make different patterns for decorating the house. Each pattern has a specific meaning, such as new born baby in the family or a loss of a family member and other cultural habits, games and symbolism. This was the experience the students will take long to forget!

Bafokeng Kimberley Pilgrimage

This year marks the anniversary of the Bafokeng Pilgrimage to Kimberley, which occurs every three years. The Pilgrimage is in honour of the men who gave their lives while working in the diamond mines in Kimberley. These men were sent to work in the mines and earn money to contribute to buying the land for the Bafokeng people. The land was bought through a Lutheran missionary, H.C. Penzhorn, to by-pass the system of segregation and inequality that excluded black Africans from owning land. This has ultimately led to the success of the Bafokeng today. The Pilgrimage will be led by Mmemegolo on the 24 September and Morafe are invited to register through the Legato Reception for the event. - News from our **SHERPA childcare** includes Rina Hawkins leaving at the end of May – she is moving back to her hometown in Cape Town. New childcare assistants include Victoria Ncaba in Grade 4 and Otsile Mokgatle in Grade 6. We are very excited that they joined the SHERPA team.
- The **Lebone II Library** continues its work visiting local ECD Centres to share literacy and curriculum based activities. We have now adopted a second pre-school, Tannie Annetjie in the Bafokeng community. We enjoy our twice-monthly visits with the school, as we do with Semane Preschool.
- **Bafokeng Grannies** have been helping to share their experiences and stories with our Foundation Phase. We are running a **storytelling hour** where we invite grannies from the community to share traditional stories with the young children.
- **The Presidents' Award Hike** took place in May. 17 hikers shared two days on Kranskloof farm, where the weather challenged the children to think creatively about their clothing options, creating functional raincoats out of black-bags. 32mm of rain was measured on Day One, with another 75mm during the night. The attendees took the opportunity to cook for themselves and had fun despite not having hot water to wash with. Finishing 15km on the one weekend ensures that only another 9km as a top-up to complete the bronze medals.
- **Professor David Block** visited Lebone to do an **astronomy**-based presentation for our Upper School students. This was an enriching experience for our students and so much was learnt. It was an honour for us to host him at our school.
